

## Treatment Act

*Women who are Kansas residents and who are diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer through this program are eligible for referral to KanCare (Kansas Medicaid). These women typically receive their medical card within two weeks of the completed Treatment Act application. Other treatment options may be available for women not eligible for KanCare.*

## Payment Processing

Early Detection Works is now using a cloud based reimbursement system. This has dramatically improved the processing time for payments. Currently, the typical processing time between the date of service and issue of a check or direct deposit is 44 days.

## How Women Enroll in Early Detection Works

Women enroll by calling the toll-free number, 1-877-277-1368, and answering the eligibility questions. Enrollments take five to 10 minutes. Bilingual enrollments are available.

# BECOMING A PROVIDER

## Eligibility

This program pays for breast and cervical cancer screenings and diagnostics for Kansas women who:

- **Are 40 to 64 years old** for cervical cancer screenings.
- **Are 45 to 64 years old** for breast cancer screenings.

Women younger than 45 with breast or cervical health concerns should call to find out what resources are available.

- **Do not have health insurance.**
- **Have this much family income or less before taxes:**

## CPT Codes and Reimbursement

Early Detection Works reimburses for a select number of breast and cervical screening and diagnostic services, primarily: office visits, Pap and HPV testing, mammograms, ultrasounds, breast biopsies and cervical diagnostics. ## Provider Responsibilities

To become an Early Detection Works provider, health care organizations must:

- 1) Contract with Kansas Department of Health and Environment.
- 2) Have a referral relationship with a network of Early Detection Works providers able to provide all of the breast and cervical continuum needed to complete a diagnosis. This includes: breast and cervical primary care, colposcopy, radiology, laboratory, biopsy and anesthesia services.
- 3) Participate in payment reimbursement training and submit reimbursement requests online.



## Talking Points for Patients

- More than 75 percent of breast and cervical cancers occur in women 50 years old and older. A woman's risk of getting cancer increases with age.
- In Kansas each year, about 370 women die of breast cancer and about 30 die from cervical cancer.
- Regular mammograms among women 50 to 69 years old can reduce deaths by 30 percent.
- In the past 40 years, the number of cervical cancer cases and deaths have greatly decreased. This is largely due to women getting regular Pap tests that can find cervical pre-cancer before it turns into cancer.
- Routine screening and prompt treatment can reduce illness and deaths from breast or cervical cancer.
